CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

So, it's that time of year again when we enjoy festivities and, for many, observe religious events. We can learn a lot in our current social and political climate from Christmas and its history; for it can act as an allegory for the present. Christmas has not always been the way we currently see it, in fact, it borrows many of its rituals from old faith celebrations such as Saturnalia – the Roman festival of Saturn in which much merrymaking and indulgence occurred...the event also took place in December. The other big inspiration for the early Christian celebration of Christmas was the pagan festival of Yule which occurred on the mid-winter solstice. It is believed that Christianity adopted some of the pagan rituals of Yule such as: bringing inside trees and making evergreen wreaths, also feasting. These adoptions were made to make the budding religion more palatable as the church spread its message far into western and northern Europe. So, we can see today how these faith rituals of other cultures have become endemic to our festivities, but how is all this relevant?

We are a diverse society, made up of people from all walks of life and different cultures, many of the things we assume to be a harbinger for "our" identity simply would not exist without external influence. We are able to evolve ideas and create when we merge cultural and social boundaries. We are greater when we are a sum of all our parts rather than a collection of individuals. Christmas has shown why this school of thought is so beneficial.

As a council, we are essentially a hotpot of individuals who have different ideas and approaches for how they wish our community to look and grow: it is when we come together that great things can happen. But the same also applies when the council accepts influence and works with other organisations such as that of the Chamber of Commerce or other essential groups in the town which provide fantastic services.

This holiday season is a time for togetherness, a time for breaking bread with loved ones and catching up with those significant to you. It is also a time for charity and giving, and a time for humility. Honiton's Health Matters - A Year Later

The purpose of Honiton Health Matters is to provide a network for organizations and groups to improve health and wellbeing outcomes for people living in Honiton and surrounding parishes. The inaugural meeting was held on 18th January 2018, followed by meetings on 6th March, 17th April, 21st June and 8th October 2018. The response to talking about what we know, where there are gaps/challenges and how, as a community we will address these to ensure collaborative approaches to co-design and co-produce local health services/activities in the future that meet the needs of all the people in our communities has been extraordinary. Communication is a fundamental challenge for all of the stakeholders and community groups alike. To this end, the April forum included a presentation from Honiton Surgery offering the Surgery Alcove for staged Community Service Displays. In December, the emphasis is on loneliness, isolation and the downside of Christmas. Our Honiton groups involved will be TRIP/Acorn Befrienders, Open Arms East Devon and Honiton Carers Support Group. The website is in the process of design, and 'the paper for Honiton' is fast becoming an extremely valuable community asset.

Honiton Health Matters has been supported by Honiton Town Council, East Devon District Council, Devon County Council and the Royal Devon & Exeter Hospital Trust, all of whom have helped with funding for our Community Conversations, publicity and website development.
