Roundball Wood

Roundball Wood can be found on the Southern side of Honiton, skirting the top of Round Ball Hill. You can get to the wood via a kissing gate at the bottom of Battishorne Way, and then walking up through a field to another kissing gate at the edge of the wood.

Once you enter the wood there is a circular path which will lead you right round the edge, the centre of

the wood is very boggy and not really accessi-

Due to the many springs and small streams the wardens and volunteers have constructed bridges and walk ways where the path has become very boggy, but as is the nature of this type of wood the springs seem to move from year to year, so the path can be quite muddy.

Because of its height, the views through the trees down towards Honiton and beyond are worth the climb, but the wood has much more to offer. Because it's quite wet and difficult to get to, the wood has been left to its own devices for some considerable time and this means a number of interesting habitats have had time to develop.

There are many dead trees, some still standing,

which provide homes for wood peckers and other birds and provide habitats for many types of insects. The wetter areas are ideal for amphibians such as frogs and newts and plants that require a boggy environment.

Badgers also make the wood their home, and during the summer, bats use the many crevices in the trees to roost in.

There are blue bells in the spring and wild garlic and wild orchids flowering in the meadow just above the wood, which is cut every other year.

The wardens and volunteers try to keep the paths and fences in good repair, but due to the difficulty of access, and of increasing age this can prove quite a challenge. The Town Council has commissioned a splendid new section of fence and this is a great improvement on both the appearance and safety of the area.

We have a number of ongoing projects, such as cutting back some of the Holly to allow more light in, and coppicing more of the Hazel. This is done to provide an even greater diversity of habitat.

If you know anyone who would like to save money on going to the gym, and at the same time improve the environment, we are always looking for more volunteers and wardens for the wood, and new ideas.
